Sample Description

Initial Recruitment Survey

- N = 910; April 26^{th} May 9^{th} , 2023
- Race/Ethnicity:
 - 14.8% (n = 134) Black
 - 9.4% (n = 85) Latinx
 - 18.9% (n = 171) other racial/ethnic groups
 - 56.9% (n = 515) White
- Income Levels:
 - 26.0% (n = 222) below 200% FPL
 - 68.0% (n = 581) 200%-400% FPL
 - 6.0% (n = 51) above 400% FPL
- Counties:
 - Berrien County: 21.7%, n = 197
 - Branch County: 6.6%, n = 60
 - Calhoun County: 15.7%, n = 143
 - Cass County: 9.0%, n = 82
 - Kalamazoo County: 26.4%, n = 240

Second Recruitment Survey

- N = 703; October 9th October 27th, 2023
- Race/Ethnicity:
 - 20.1% (n = 141) Black
 - 10.4% (n = 73) Latinx
 - 3.1% (n = 21) other racial/ethnic groups
 - 66.5% (n = 467) White
- Income Levels:
 - 12.8% (n = 89) below 200% FPL
 - 81.8% (n = 567) 200%-400% FPL
 - 5.3% (n = 37) above 400% FPL
- Counties:
 - Berrien County: 13.5%, n = 95
 - Branch County: 28.0%, n = 197
 - Calhoun County: 11.4%, n = 80
 - Cass County: 9.8%, n = 69
 - Kalamazoo County: 14.7%, n = 103



Survey Question: When you were a new parent, what would your most ideal child care arrangement have been?


- Extended leave or financial support so I could stay home with my child(ren)



Ideal Child Care Arrangement When Having Equal Access, Overall






Ideal Child Care Arrangement When Having Equal Access County Differences in Recent Survey




Applied for and Receiving Child Care Subsidy, Overall






Applied for/Received Child Care Subsidy Racial/Ethnic Differences

Applied for and Receiving Child Care Subsidy, by County






Why Not Applying for Subsidy

- Not listed


Reason of NOT Applying for Child Care Subsidy, Overall



Difficulty Finding Accepting Provider & Maintaining Subsidy




Difficulty Finding Accepting Provider & Maintaining Subsidy by Race/Ethnicity

Difficulty Using/Maintaining Child Care Subsidy, by County




New Modules – Child Care Related

Willingness to Use Center-Based Care

Survey Question: If there was a center that matched your culture and values, would you send your child there for care?

Finding: 93% participants reported willingness to use center-based care




GSRP Program Enrollment

Survey Question: Is your child in the Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP)? The Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) is Michigan's state-funded preschool Program for income-eligible, four-year-old children.

Finding: **39%** participants reported children in the GSRP






Importance of Preschool Experiences

Survey Question: How important are each of the following for your child's preschool experience? Analyses only conducted among 409 families who had children entering preschool

- One-on-one attention for my child
- Support for social-emotional learning
- Approach to behavior management/guidance
- Support for my child's reading skills
- Support for my child's math skills
- •Helping my child adjust to a classroom environmen
- •Support for my special needs of my child
- Attention paid to health and safety
- Program staff and/or other families who share my culture, traditions, and language
- •Lead teachers have a bachelor's degree
- Program staff has significant years of experience
- Classroom has small teacher to child ratios
- •Teachers are compensated the same as K-12 teachers
- •Program covers the hours that I am at work
- •Program is in a location convenient to home or worl
- •More than one of my children can attend the same location
- •My child can be in one location during the day rathe than in many places






Most Wanted Type of Provider for Preschool

PARENT VOICES IN OCTOBER SURVEY - What's Most Challenging?

Affording childcare and affording ANYTHING. Dealing with a son with special needs and severe mental health issues. Trying to balance work demands and days off needed for elderly parents and sick kids.— Parent in Kalamazoo County

The biggest challenge is money, especially with the ailing condition of my child it's very difficult – Parent in Branch County

My family income is not enough to support the daily expenses of the family and it is difficult to meet the needs of childcare. – *Parent in Branch County*

Having a stable daycare. Staffing shortages make that challenging currently. Additionally when [our] child is sick (which is inevitable) and sent home that means either my husband and I have to take off work which makes it really challenging. It's a ripple effect.— Parent in Kalamazoo ounty

PARENT VOICES IN OCTOBER SURVEY - What's Helping?

When you are very busy and can't spare the time to be with your children, relatives, friends and neighbors who take your children to and from school, daycare centers and schools are also a great help.— Parent in Kalamazoo County

Reliable and high-quality childcare options that allow parents to work or have some personal time while ensuring the child's well-being.— Parent in Berrien County

Provide parental support and training to help us cope with parenting challenges and pressures. This can include training courses providing parenting skills and knowledge, home visits and coaching, and opportunities for emotional support and understanding. – *Parent in Branch County*

Community resources and support organizations can provide families with practical help, education, and social connections—Parent in Branch County



New Modules – Health Related

Child Disability & Receiving Support

- In October sample, 1.6% (n = 11) participants reported children having disabilities
- When asked whether they agree with the statement "My child with disabilities and/or special needs is receiving the appropriate support they need throughout their early care and education experience," only 36% somewhat agree, and 36% disagree.
- We received two open-ended responses about this topic:

"The whole pediatric mental health care system is broken. There's not enough space here to justify our experience."

"One is virtually impaired."
